

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Founding Story Timeline to NTFS!

August 1980	Rhonda Dunne contacts radio station 8DN to seek interest for respite.
March 1981	A meeting of many local Darwin clubs decided to form a committee to retain public interest.
April 1981	10 host families are able to provide support for families.
1981	Sponsor Family Association (SFA) begins incorporation process.
August 1981	Official process for incorporation complete. Matching of families and children begins.
Early 1982	17 families are requiring support. 12 host families are providing support.
June 1982	Still a voluntary organisation and a government grant application is approved.
AGM 1982	10 families requiring support 5 families providing support.
March 1982	Incorporation officially recognised on 9th March 1982.
Sept 1984	Distribution of first newsletter.
October 1984	Proposal to extend SFA to include the provision of paid carers.
Feb 1988	SFA approached to extend the service to Katherine.
June 1988	Intensive discussions underway for Katherine project.
August 1989	Katherine project commences in staff homes and kitchens with no fixed abode.
October 1992	Submission for Peer Pilot Program.
1993	Commonwealth State Disability Agreement providing community-based in-home respite in Katherine
Dec 1997	Our first office in Kintore Street, Katherine.
May 1998	After devastating floods on Australia Day 1998 we moved into Training Network building.
2001	We celebrate 20 years of service and change the name to NT Friendship & Support Inc.
2002	NTFS running from Darwin and Katherine - HACC, FACS and CSDA
2002	MAISY computer system installed with start up funding of \$25,000
2002	Commence Respite for Bush Kids
2003	Commence the separation of Darwin and Katherine
2004	Organisation officially separates.
2005	Katherine takes on the Incorporation and Constitution NT Friendship & Support.

For the period January 2017 - May 2017 the organisation ran without an Executive Officer. During this period the Care Coordinator, Vicki Rossiter, stepped up into the role of Acting Manager and worked alongside the Management Committee in keeping operations ticking along. Thank you Vicki, you did a stellar job in caretaking the organisation through a rough six months.

Our Management Committee, comprised of Jo Gamble, Christina Allgood, Daniela Ford, Jackie Usher and Mark Wood, stepped up to the job of supporting Vicki in the Acting Manager's role to ensure continuity of services. The Management Committee's commitment to the organisation during that period was, and continues to be, exemplary.

I would like to thank the staff for their commitment to the organisation in stepping up and into unfamiliar roles, Patricia Kelly, Bernie Fernandez, Jess Croft, OT Rhiannon Crispe and more recently Collin Mullane and Hiruni Manawadu.

I have been working on the governance of the organisation ensuring that we have appropriate policies and solid procedures in place. This has been a tough road for staff with so many changes, however, they are a robust team and are coming through the other side well managing the wave of change.

Objectives



Out of Home Care



Out of Home Care program is run in conjunction with Territory Families and continues to grow from strength to strength.

The last 12 months has seen a growth in eligible carers available to deliver the out of home care model for children in the care of Territory Families.

Our carers deliver this model of care in their homes. The process of assessment for eligibility is a rigorous one that can take 6 to 12 months.

This year, to ensure that our probity checks continue to be of the highest integrity, we have signed up to the Australian Childhood Foundations Safe Guarding Children accreditation. This process will take about 12 months to complete. All staff, volunteers, carers and committee members will have to do the online learning. This is a compulsory and welcomed measure.

In February 2017 a child that had been in our care successfully transitioned to a kinship carer at Ngukurr. This is a positive outcome for the child who is now thriving in their community and is top of their class and attending school regularly. Another child from Ngukurr also transitioned successfully in August 2016 to a kinship carer. The family have proudly reported back how well the child is doing. There are another two siblings currently in the process of transition to kinship and family reunification.

In December 2016 we supported foster and family carers to attend the Variety Special Children's Christmas Party in Darwin. This included an overnight stay at Palms Village Resort. We also attended the Territory Families Foster Children's Christmas Party at the Katherine YMCA Pool on 10th December 2016. We held a good old Aussie tradition of a sausage sizzle and fresh fruit which was enjoyed by all.



Host Family Respite



During the 2016/2017 year Disability Respite Services have provided 30 clients with 9434 hours of respite. We also provided 250 hours of occupational therapy alongside another 250 hours of individual client respite.

A young client who had been isolated and struggled to make meaningful friends recently accessed respite with NTFS. They are approaching adolescence and need to gain some independence and inclusion into the wider community.

With weekly respite with an age appropriate volunteer the client has been able to be included in regular youth community activities. This has now

expanded into school and has seen the evolution of natural friendships and supports, decreasing the need for support staff at school.

A teenager fast approaching adulthood who accesses our respite services, clearly had very low self esteem. By accessing weekly respite and working towards some clearly defined goals this young individual has now been able to actively be involved in their community and has made amazing progress towards their goals.

Employment was the focus and they have been supported to develop a resume and get job ready. This entailed obtaining a tax file number, opening a bank account and having some mentoring on what work and employment really mean to them.



The next big goal is studying to obtain a learners permit so they can learn to drive a car.

Commonwealth Home Support Program

The CHSP program continues to grow in strength. The program has delivered 956 hours of individual support alongside of 963 hours of group support.

Under CHSP we link frail older people who are at risk of isolation to volunteers and people and activities in the community, this goes towards keeping them living independently in the community and so reducing the need for them to enter aged care facilities.

The individual program is where our wonderful volunteers work with seniors at risk of isolation in the community. Their dedication to their roles is amazing! This program could not run without their commitment.

The group activities have been a highlight with Seniors Month being celebrated at Nitmiluk with a fine dining evening at the Cicada Lodge.

Bright Lights

NT Friendship & Support has been supporting seniors in the Katherine region since 2015. From here it was identified that the amelioration grant fitted into the then seniors programs we were running.

NT Friendship & Support aimed to minimise problem gambling juxtaposing the negative peripheral effects for the community of Katherine and remote communities.





We used a strength-based approach utilising the underpinning strategies of motivational interviewing techniques whilst providing alternative positive activities.

The funding was for 600hrs of service provision for people over the age of 65 who were affected directly or indirectly by the effects of gambling until June 2016. In that period NT Friendship & Support was able to provide 343.50 hours.

On April 3rd 2016 we held a fun day at Nitmiluk. We were overwhelmed with the attendance of seniors and families from the local community. We were able to reach a larger section of the community with our antigambling messages and education, along with Ranger Clare from Parks and Wildlife, displays and activities. We were able to engage the local Rotarians to donate the use of a bouncy castle and a healthy lunch provided for attendees.



Extension of Program

NTFS are situated in Katherine so recruitment and retention of staff is always an ongoing battle. We were unable to deliver on 600 hours in the period of the program and so applied for an extension. This was granted on 15th June 2016.

For the period July 2016 through to June 2017 NTFS provided a further 340.00 hours of deliverables in the form of 1:1 support in out reach services, group support and education for the identified cohort. This program was acquitted at the end of June 2017 with no further funding available.

Treasurer's Report

NT Friendship & Support has worked diligently this year as it managed all of the operational changes.

Statement of Comprehensive Income

NT Friendship & Support reported a net surplus of \$254,250.

We have had an increase in total income of \$65,712 compared to 2015/2016.

Our expenses also rose by \$100,367. This was attributed to an increase in salaries and wages. This saw a drop in surplus by \$34,606.

Statement of Financial Position

NT Friendship & Support has current assets of \$1,428,349 and liabilities of \$227,435 and is in a financially sound position.

Cash flow Statement

Cash held has increased by \$341,409 in 2015-16 to \$1,246,958 currently.

In December, 2016, we farewelled our Executive Officer, Kate Ganley. Kate had navigated NTFS through significant growth and change and we are grateful to her for her dedication.

The small but energetic team, led by Vicki Rossiter, with significant involvement from the NTFS Board spent almost six months managing NTFS and continuing to keep the ship sailing under difficult circumstances. I feel indebted to Vicki and Tricia for their hard work over this period.

We welcomed a new Executive Officer, Stephanie Ransome, and the board finally took a breath (and a step back). Stephanie has been energetic, innovative and is leading her team and NTFS into an exciting new year and new world of NDIS and new projects.

We find ourselves moving forward in a secure and firm financial position, with much potential growth envisaged. I am excited about our future and the continuing exceptional service we strive to provide for vulnerable members of the Katherine Community and Region.

NT Friendship & Support are solvent and in a strong trading position for the next financial year.

Independent Auditor's Report to the Members of NT Friendship and Support Incorporated

Report on the Financial Report

I have audited the accompanying financial report, being a general purpose financial report, of NT Friendship and Support Incorporated which comprises the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2017 and the statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity, statement of cash flow and committee of management statement for the year ended on that date, a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Committee's Responsibility for the Financial Report

The Management Committee is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report and has determined that the basis of preparation described in Note 1 the financial report is appropriate to meet the requirements of the *Australian Charities and Not-For-Profits Commission Act 2012* and the *Associations Act (NT* and are appropriate to meet the needs of the members. Auditors Qualification

Although the statement of comprehensive income and statement of financial position comparative figures reflect last financial years audit there were a number of errors and omissions in these statements. These have been detailed in my management letter and adjusted through a posting to an equity account, historical balance, in this report. The errors and omissions relate to the non-adjustment of insurance as a prepayment, the incorrect assumption of an amount owing by the Australian Taxation Office which was subsequently accounted for twice when preparing the financial position statement, incorrect closing balances in bank accounts and apparent confusion between the terms Care Levy & Care Brokerage and how they should be treated in the statement of comprehensive income.
