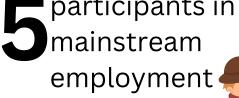

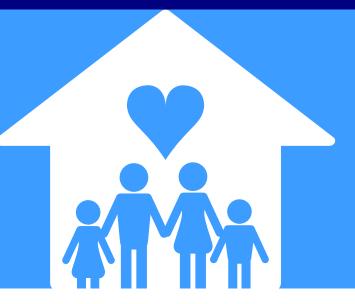
One of our key achievements has been working with Carers, Families, Young people and Territory Families, Housing and Communities to successfully reunify young people back in to the community and with family.
